- Key activities

Characteristics of the Asian Region

- Customs operating environment:
 - Export driven economies; huge trade volumes
 - Big global transportation hubs
 - Increase in risks and threats
- Customs administrations:
 - Customs mandates differ; no one-size-fits-all model exists for the region
 - Customs business by nature very import-driven
 - Different levels of capacity
- Customs and non-proliferation





Focus areas for the future

- Legislation
 - Legislation and control powers not always sufficient
 - Promising developments; how to reproduce the success in the region?
- Organizational priorities
 - STCE not often on top of the priority order
 - How can we change this? Advocacy?
- Operational issues
 - Resources; Infrastructure; Skills and knowledge
 - Prioritization; Customs modernization efforts; targeted training
- Cooperation
 - National, regional and international cooperation
 - "Connecting" Customs nationally, regionally, and internationally





What is the WCO doing to help its Members in Asia?

- STCE Project
 - Launched in 2013
 - Awareness-raising
- Training
 - Preparation of a STCE Training Curriculum
 - Part 1 available in March 2014
- International cooperation
 - Multilateral efforts to prevent and detect illicit trafficking
 - Seminar 8 10 April 2014, WCO HQ, Brussels, Belgium
 - All Customs Administrations from the Asian Region are expected to participate
- Infrastructure
 - Cargo Targeting System (CTS) Application
 - nCEN Application





Conclusion



- Customs mandate
 - Compliance with supply chain security AND facilitation
 - Legitimate and illicit flows
- WTO Agreement on Trade Facilitation
- Risk-based operating and control models required
- What are the implications of this in the strategic trade controls enforcement context?
- Involving Customs in national strategic trade control systems is critical...active participation needed from Customs
