

Australian Export Control System



- Australia regulates the flow of goods, services and technologies across its borders in 3 ways:
 - Requires permits for the export of <u>listed</u> goods and technologies (DECO)
 - Catch-all legislation to prohibit the supply/export/provision of unlisted dual-use and military goods and services (DECO)
 - Sanctions United Nations and Australian Autonomous (Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade)



Legislation administered by Defence Export Control Office (DECO)




Australia has different legislation to regulate controlled and 'catch-all'

Controlled:

- Tangible exports
 - Customs Act 1901
 - Customs (Prohibited Exports) Regulations 1958 Regulation 13E
 - Defence and Strategic Goods List control list
- Intangibles and brokering
 - Defence Trade Controls Act 2012

Catch-all:

- Weapons of Mass Destruction (Prevention of Proliferation) Act 1995 WMD Act
- Military end-use provision (s112BA) of the Customs Act 1901





Catch-All Controls – WMD Act



WMD Act

- Power to prohibit the supply/export/ provision of <u>non-regulated</u> goods and services that may contribute to a WMD program
- 13 prohibition notices have been issued since 1995
- Offence to supply/export/provide goods or services to a WMD program without a permit






Catch-All Controls - WMD Act



Important to note:

- Only applies to <u>non-regulated</u> items
 - goods and technologies that are not listed in the Defence and Strategic Goods List or controlled by sanctions legislation
- Supply
 - transfers within Australia
- Export
- Provision of services
 - doing anything that confers a benefit on, grants a right or privilege to, provides a facility for, or otherwise assists someone
- Low threshold
 - Minister only has to <u>believe or suspect</u>




Catch-All Controls - WMD Act Offences



Offence to:

- supply/export/provide goods or services
- where a person <u>believes or suspects</u> that the goods or services may be used in a WMD program
- the supply/export/provision is not authorised by a permit
- Penalty: imprisonment up to 8 yrs.



Catch-All Controls - Military End-use Provision




- Minister has power to prohibit the export of <u>unlisted</u> goods where:
 - goods are not listed on the DGSL <u>AND</u>
 - may be for a military end-use <u>AND</u>
 - export may prejudice the security, defence or international relations of Australia
- Used once since it commenced in 2012






- Australian company applied to DECO for permission to export radiation-hardened electronic components to an end-user
- Technical assessors assessed goods:
 - not listed in the Defence and Strategic Goods List
 - but significant utility to a Weapons of Mass Destruction
 Program





 DECO proceeded to assess the goods under the catch-all Weapons of Mass Destruction Act


- Goods were dual-use
 - legitimate uses for satellites
 - also essential in the development of a ballistic missile capability






Inputs included:

- Technical assessment of the goods
- Further information from the Australian company (natural justice)
- Intelligence
- Consultation with regime countries that had listed similar export denials
- Foreign policy advice
- Legal advice






- DECO recommended to the Minister for Defence to exercise the prohibition power under the WMD Act
 - utility of the goods
 - links of concern from the end-user to WMD program
 - similar regime denials
 - Similar utility of the goods
 - Same end-user
 - Age of the regime denials
 - Consult the country that listed the regime denial





- Minister for Defence agreed to prohibit
- Australian company notified and outreached
- Australia listed a regime denial with the Nuclear Suppliers Group
- Prohibition not made public
 - no evidence that the company knew that the goods would be diverted




