Asia STC Challenges (1)



Challenges stemming from the international level

- Gaps in the international legal foundation for regulating trade in "dual-use" items
- No international "control list"
- Differing perceptions of and/or perspectives on proliferation threats

Asia STC Challenges (2)

Regional-level challenges in Asia

- Volume and speed of foreign trade throughout the region
- Different levels of STC system development across the region
- Differences in control lists among the countries and areas that have established STC systems

Timing of control list updates (for demonstrative purposes only, may already be out-of-date)

Asia STC Challenges (4)

National-level challenges in Asia

- Level of industry awareness of STCs in all systems
- Emphasis on extra-territorial application of U.S. export controls in more established systems
- Agencies with technical capability and political capability may not be the same in developing systems
- Personnel capacity in developing systems
- Pre-existing regulatory "silos" in developing systems

Notional Asia STC Solutions (1)

Coming from the international level:

 A new UNSCR resolution that makes explicit reference to or incorporation of the control lists of the major MECRs



 Continued work of World Customs Organization (WCO) on correlating Harmonized System (HS) codes with MECR-listed items



 Build upon the Arms Trade Treaty (ATT) and Chemical Weapons Convention (CWC) experiences for other types of strategic items

Notional Asia STC Solutions (2)

Regional level:

- Continue, if not expand, regional-level engagement on STCs, perhaps in conjunction with regional economic initiatives, and raise awareness about eachother's STCs
- Attempt to coordinate a cross-regional control list "catch-up", at least in the Asia Pacific portion, with some systems waiting and others speeding-up with their control list updates
- Build upon the Arms Trade Treaty (ATT) and Chemical Weapons Convention (CWC) experiences for other types of strategic items

Notional Asia STC Solutions (3)







National level:

- For systems under development: establish some level of legal-regulatory and bureaucratic STC "interconnectivity" and consider the potential economic gains
- For established systems: increase enforcement and public awareness of enforcement
- For all: place substantial emphasis on industry outreach and compliance and promoting national export control requirements
