Hong Kong's Situation

In 2016, Hong Kong was -

The 7th Largest Trading Entity

• Trade volume = US\$ 1,064.1 billion

The Busiest Air Cargo Terminal

• Air cargo throughput = 4.5 million cubic tonnes

The 5th Busiest Container Port

Ocean cargo throughput = 19.8 million
 Twenty-foot equivalent units containers

Background

- Separate Customs Territory
- Autonomous Trading Entity
- Administration of Own Strategic Trade Control System

Objectives

- Prevent Hong Kong from being used as a conduit for proliferation
- Secure continued access to high technology goods

Our Current System: The Four Pillars





Legal Definition of Transhipment



"Transhipment cargo" means any imported article that :-

- is or to be removed from the vessel, aircraft or vehicle in which it was imported and either returned to the same vessel, aircraft or vehicle or transferred to another vessel, aircraft or vehicle before being exported
- is consigned on a through bill of lading or through air waybill from a place outside Hong Kong to another place outside Hong Kong

Legal Definition of Transit



"Article in transit" means an article which :-

- is brought into Hong Kong solely for the purpose of taking it out of Hong Kong; and
- remains at all times in / on the vessel or aircraft which brings it into Hong Kong

Licensing for Transhipment and Transit (1)



- Transhipment cargo and article-in-transit are regarded as separate import and export
- Transhipment:
 Licences are required unless otherwise exempted under law

Licensing for Transhipment and Transit (2)



- Article-in-transit:
 Licences are required for specified sensitive items (certain munitions and all nuclear-related materials and equipment)
- WMD end-use : Licences are required without exception

Licensing for Intermediate Trade (1)



Intermediate Trade:
 Trade in semi-finished goods / parts and components across customs territories so as to arrive at the finished goods

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Licensing for Intermediate Trade (2)



- Technical specifications of strategic commodities are set out in the Schedule 1 to the Import and Export (Strategic Commodities) Regulations, Chapter 60G of the Laws of Hong Kong, China
- An intermediate goods is subject to our licensing requirements when its technical specification meets the control threshold.

Licensing System for Strategic Commodities (1)



- Processing of a licence application
 - Technical assessment process
 - Risk assessment process

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Licensing System for Strategic Commodities (2)



- Pre-shipment licensing
- Consignment based
- Legal responsibility of carriers

Partnership between Licensing and Enforcement Authorities



- Close liaison between licensing and enforcement authorities
 - pre-licence check
 - post-shipment verification
 - delivery verification check
- Sharing investigation results and intelligence

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Extensive Enforcement Programmes



- Cargo examination
- Verification and Checks
- Intelligence
- Investigation
- Prosecution
- Outreach
